Reflections from the Rectory By The Rev. Dr. Joy A. Rose, TSSF

Dear Friends in Christ,

It's a bright and noticeably cooler morning... one of those lovely early Fall days that has me – and I would guess you also pondering exactly where we are in life and musing about what lies ahead. Oh sure, there are plenty of activities coming up just around the corner... The Blessing of the Animals, beginning visitations to those in assisted living by our ministry group, preparing for a Baptism, and making plans for a special All Saints Service, ecumenical Thanksgiving service, and yes, even for Christmas services. The Book Club is up and running, Sunday School has started, Tuesday night Bible study has begun, and, although it had a shaky start, a service of healing

has begun on Wednesday mornings. In seminary I remember being told that a priest always lives at least two months in the future. It's true. Things that happen effortlessly take lots of planning and preparation.

But ... for the moment, I'm sitting at my computer staring out the window, with my hands wrapped around my ever-present cup of coffee. Some of the leaves have started to fall, one or two at a time. It's quiet enough so that I can hear them hit the ground. In watching leaf after leaf fall, I saw something I've not noticed before ... the leaves that are more stiff, dried out up, fall down more or curled straight and land with a crunch. while the leaves that are more open waft down gently and land more softly.

I realize that this is a metaphor for the reality of our spiritual lives... Leaves fall. We fall. There is falling in our lives, and this falling – though sometimes difficult and painful – is useful, even necessary, in our cycle of life. It is an opportunity for grace, for realizing better ways to do things, for learning and growth. Our falling (s) is sometimes caused by something specific, perhaps even by something we've done. Other times there's nothing we could – or even should – have done to prevent it.

Leaves that have held on tightly to the end are drier, stiffer. They may succeed in hanging on longer, but they are sure to fall more harshly in the end. In the same way, we are often tempted to grasp onto things, onto people, onto traditions ("we've always done it this way" or "we've never done it this way") for safety, security, and "for dear life." When we're holding on tight, the grasping causes our spirits to draw inward and we become rigid. So when the falling happens - which it pretty much always does, sooner or later - the fall is harsher, and we may feel betrayed because we've tried so hard.

Leaves that let go sooner, still somewhat fresh and open, float down more easily on the unseen air and land more gently. They still fall, but the process isn't as harsh, they don't land so hard. In the same way, we can – and often should – let go when the wind of change pushes at us. When we are called to act, or do, or change something in a way that we have never done before. It's not easy.... but we do not need to fight the change. The Spirit of God who is all around us is trustworthy and will bear us up even as we fall...easing, guiding, cushioning.

We are entering the season of Fall. The winds of change are whirling around us - socially, economically, politically, personally, and in our faith lives. God will sustain us through all of the changes. "Fall" happens regularly in the cycle of life. The important questions are not about the past – Whose fault is it? How could we have avoided it? Should we have done things differently? The important questions are about the future -Where are the possibilities? How can we move into them? What is God up to and how can we best

live into His plans for each and every one of us? How can we best live into His plans for St. Luke's?

It's Fall. It's a time to let go and trust God. It's a time to see and believe in the good work God is doing for us and through us. Let us be like those leaves that let go easily and are borne down gently. Let us rest trusting fully in God and being readied for renewal in His Spirit.




New Midweek Service

The Bishop's Blog: Signs of God's Grace

To hew out of a mountain of despair, a stone of hope

Bombs in Seaside and Elizabeth. Thank God no one was hurt. Dumpster bombs in Chelsea. Thank God no one was killed. These incidents are close to home, and some of the highly reactive political rhetoric only ramps up the fear - and a common response is to either seal oneself off in a silo or hide under a rock.

And yet.

There are other responses – and in the last week I have had the privilege of witnessing and hearing several of them. While in Detroit at our House of Bishops meeting, a group of us had a chance to go to Flint and hear from the mayor, state senate minority leader and the lead local pediatrician - in an Episcopal Church, talk about their solidarity and commitment in the wake of that city's devastating water crisis.

The day before, the bishops were the inaugural audience of a four minute video by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, who eloquently and powerfully describes the Jesus movement as "loving, liberating and life-(Watch the Presiding giving." Bishop's video here.)

A bishops writing group put forth a short and compelling statement to the church that draws on the power and persuasion of the Gospel: "Let prophets tell the truth in love. Let reconcilers move boldly into places of division and disagreement. Let evangelists inspire us to tell the story of Jesus in new and compelling ways. Let leaders lead with courage and joy." (Full text, with videos in English and Spanish, available here.) Each of us has gifts that fall into one of those challenges.

And then I was present at two "Listening Table" gatherings in the diocese (I was remotely connected to a third, which took place while I was in Detroit). Some 200 people from 56 churches across the diocese came to listen to scripture, to each other and to the Holy Spirit, all of which invited and inspired those who

attended to continue the journey, following the guidance and mercy of the living Christ.

In his "I have a dream speech" in 1963, Martin Luther King, Jr. paraphrased 2 Corinthians 4:8: "to hew out of a mountain of despair, a stone of hope."

That is what I see. That is what I see others seeing and how they are responding with life-giving commitments.

And oh sweet Jesus, does it help and offer a way forward.


For the safety of all the animals it is recommended that those pets that might be skittery or nervous in new surroundings come leashed or in some type of carrier.






